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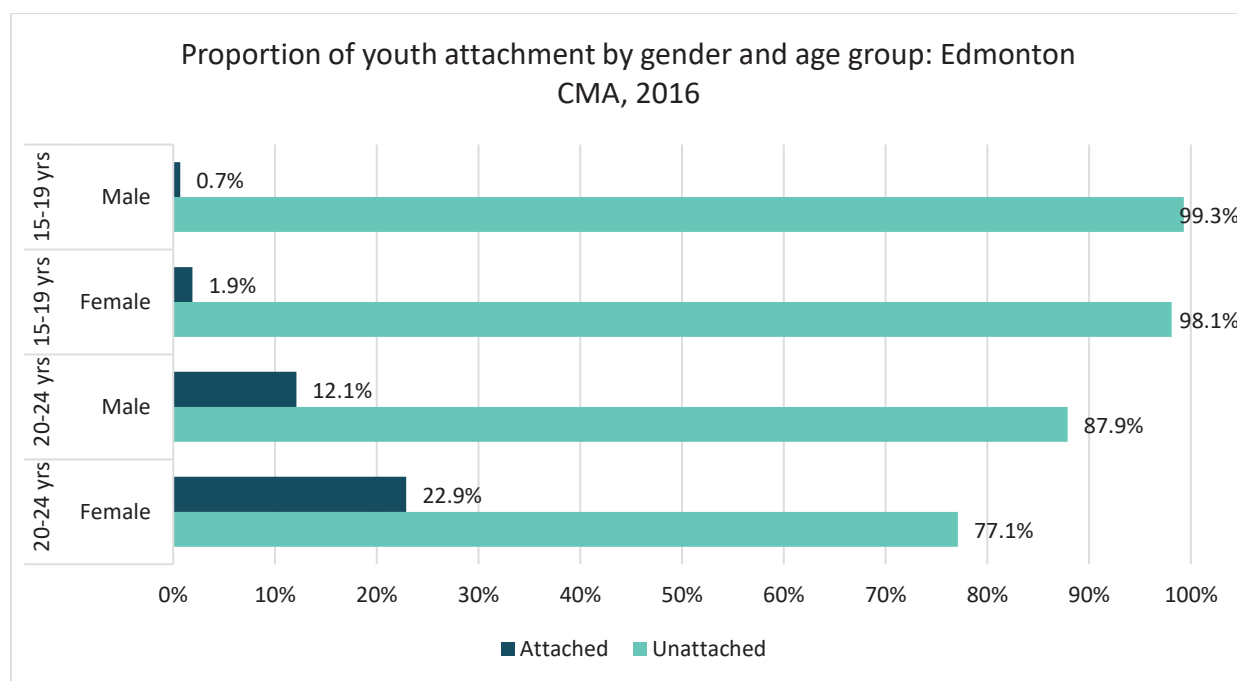
## Edmonton Profile – Youth Section

### The Population

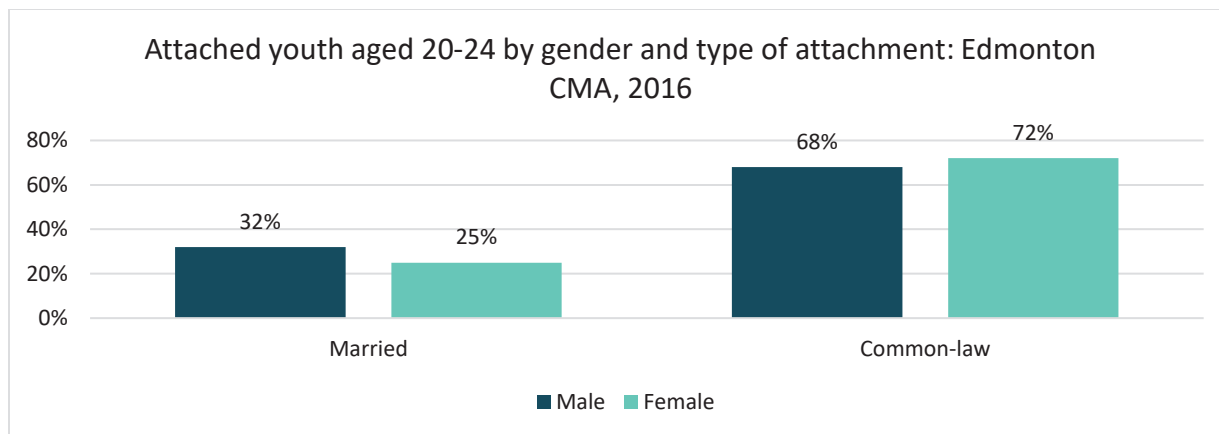
The youth section of this profile focuses primarily on ages 15 to 24 with breakdowns of 15 to 19 years and 20 to 24 years of age. The source of data is primarily from the 2016 Census of Canada. Other sources of data include 2017 Tax-filer information from Statistics Canada, suicide statistics from Alberta Justice and Solicitor General, and data from Alberta Human Services reports. Because secondary data is utilized from data tables in these sources, age groupings may vary for some presentations.

### Attachment

Attachment proportions for both youth age groups differ only marginally from the 2011 census. Two percent (2%) of the attached have same sex partners.



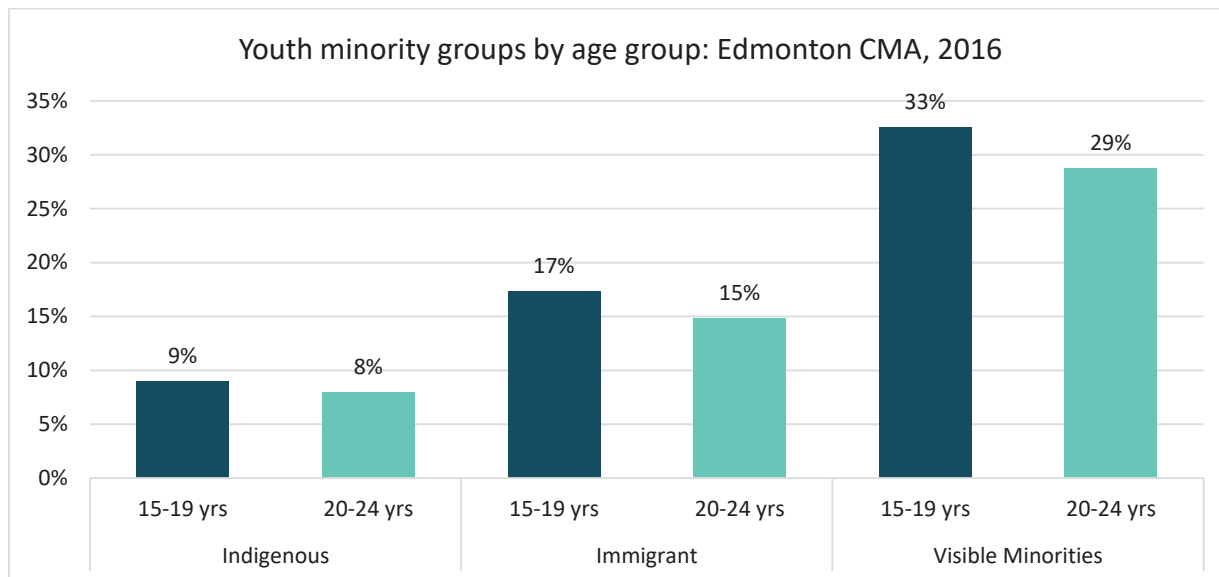
The majority of attached youth comprise common law relationships. For the 15-19 year age group fewer than 1 in 5 are married with the remainder in common-law relationships. For the 20-24 year olds who are in attached relationships, the majority are common-law. Gender differences by attachment are evident.



Although it would be interesting and relevant to learn about family structures for youth, data relating to whether youth live with one or both parents or with other relatives is available only for children up to the age of 14 years.

### Minority Groups

Three minority groups are reported; Indigenous, immigrant, and visible minorities. While the Indigenous group is exclusive, the visible minority group and immigrant groups may overlap. There are no significant differences by gender so the data in the following graph includes only breakdowns by age group.



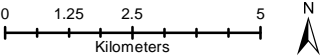
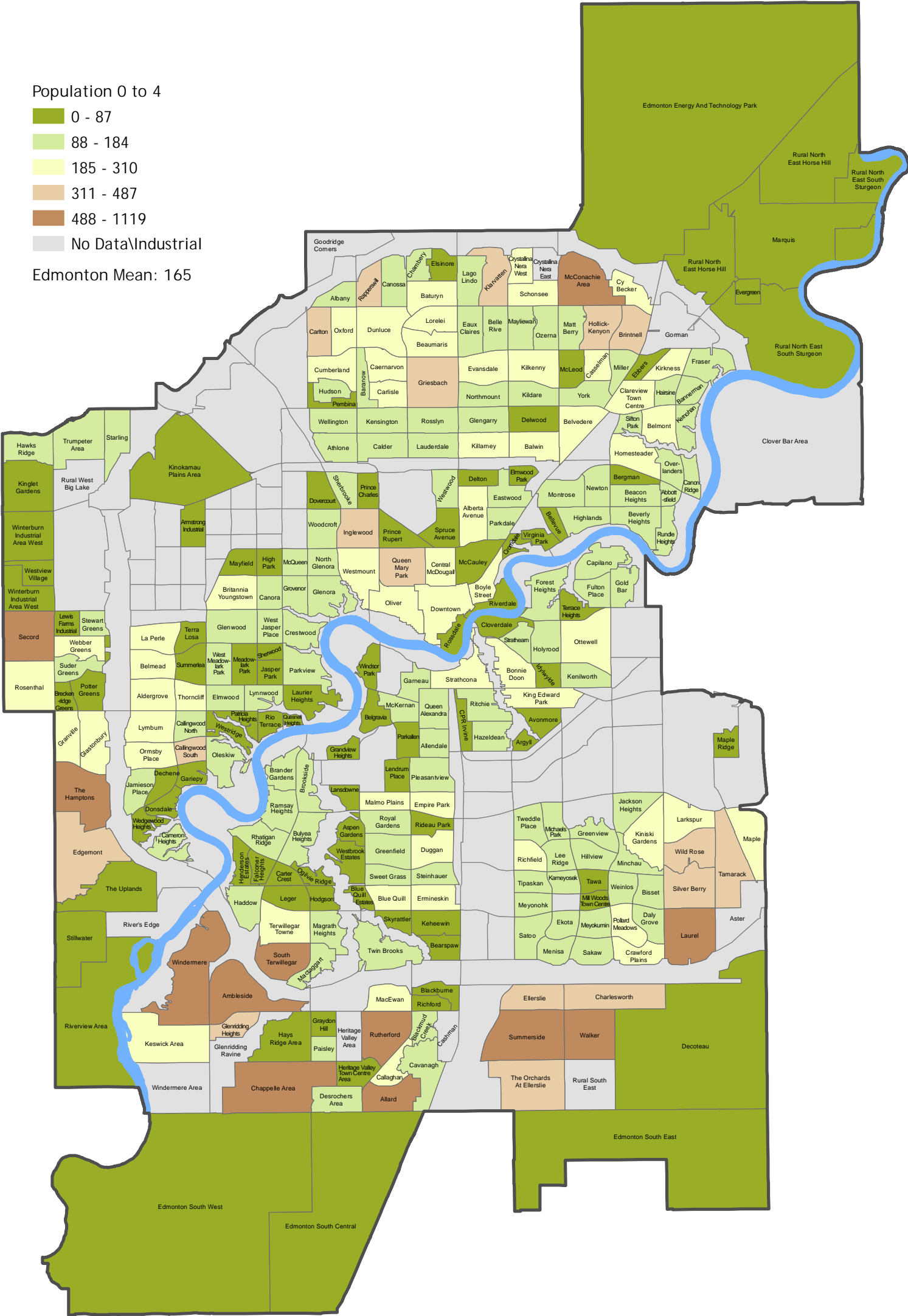

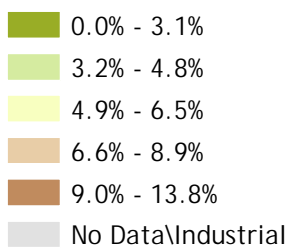

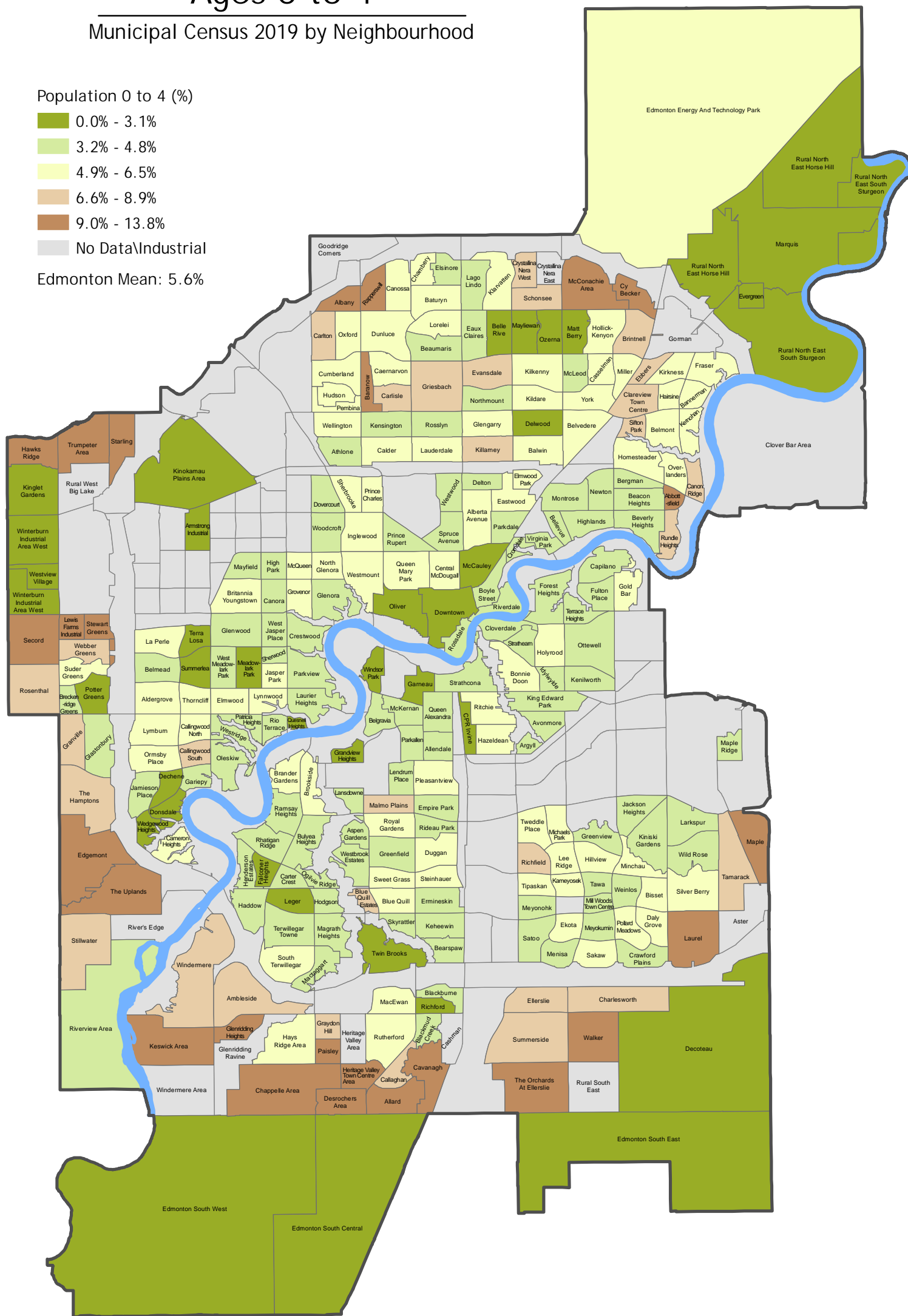


## Ages 0 to 4

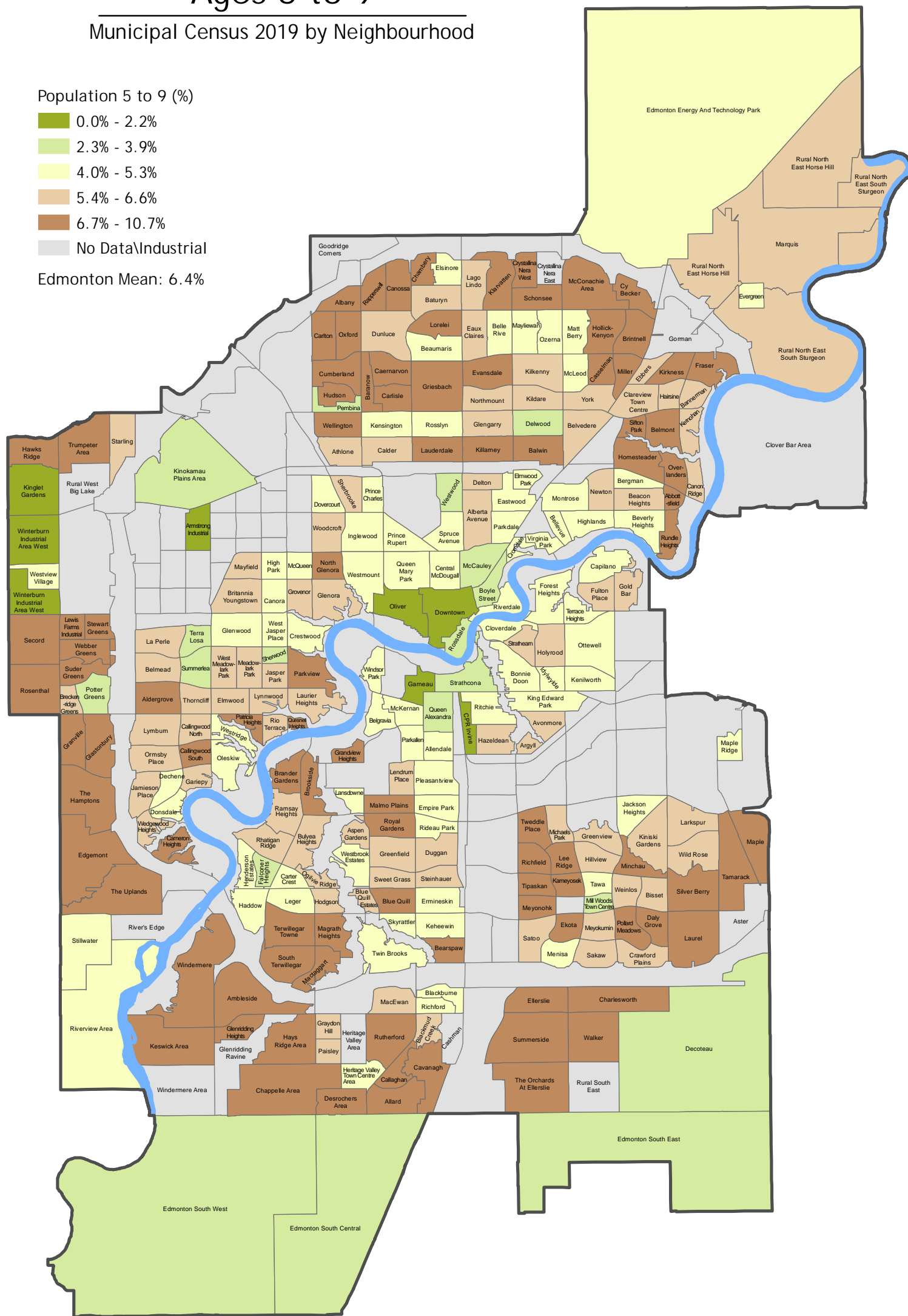




## Population 5 to 9 (%)

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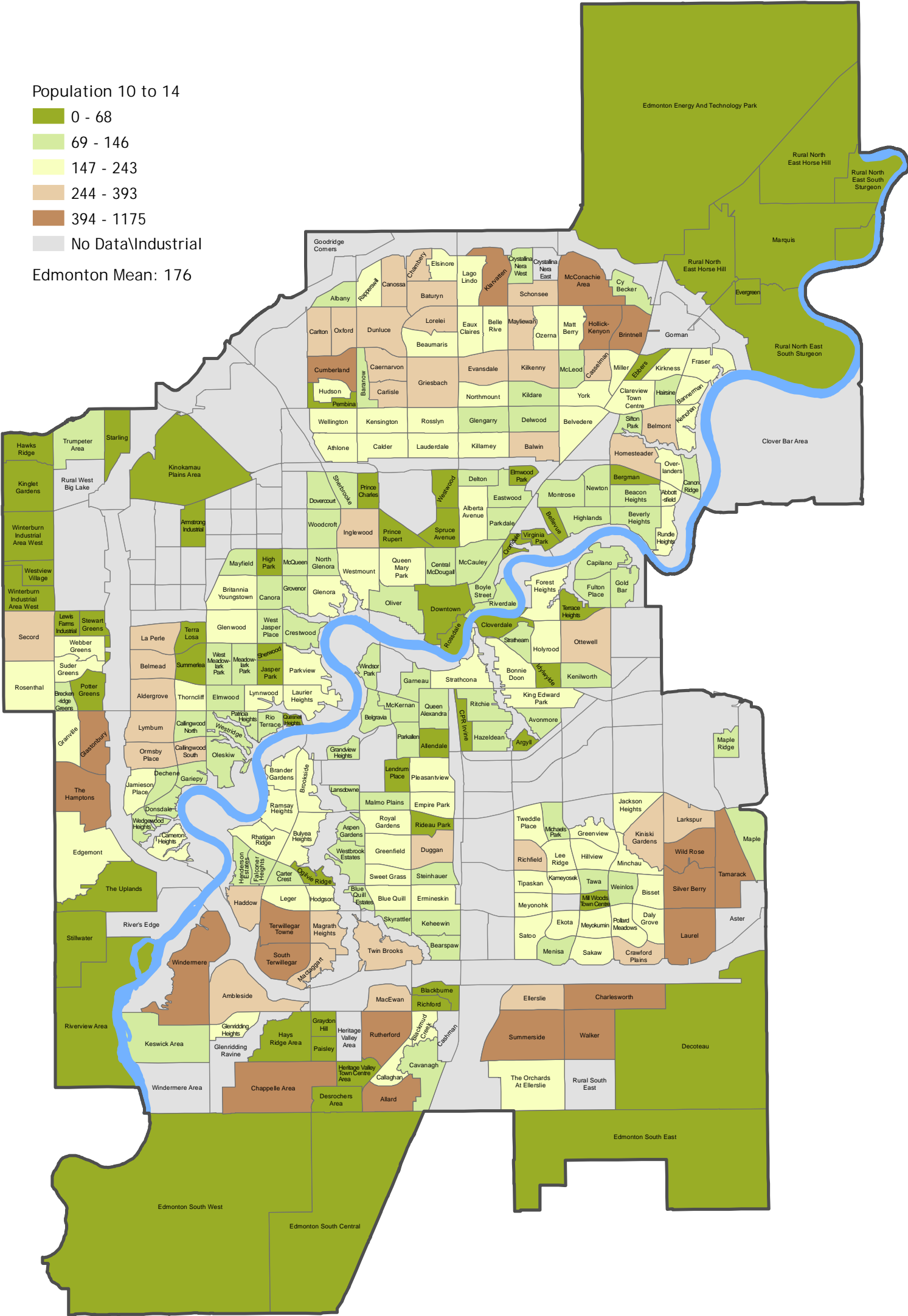

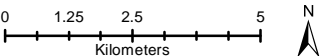
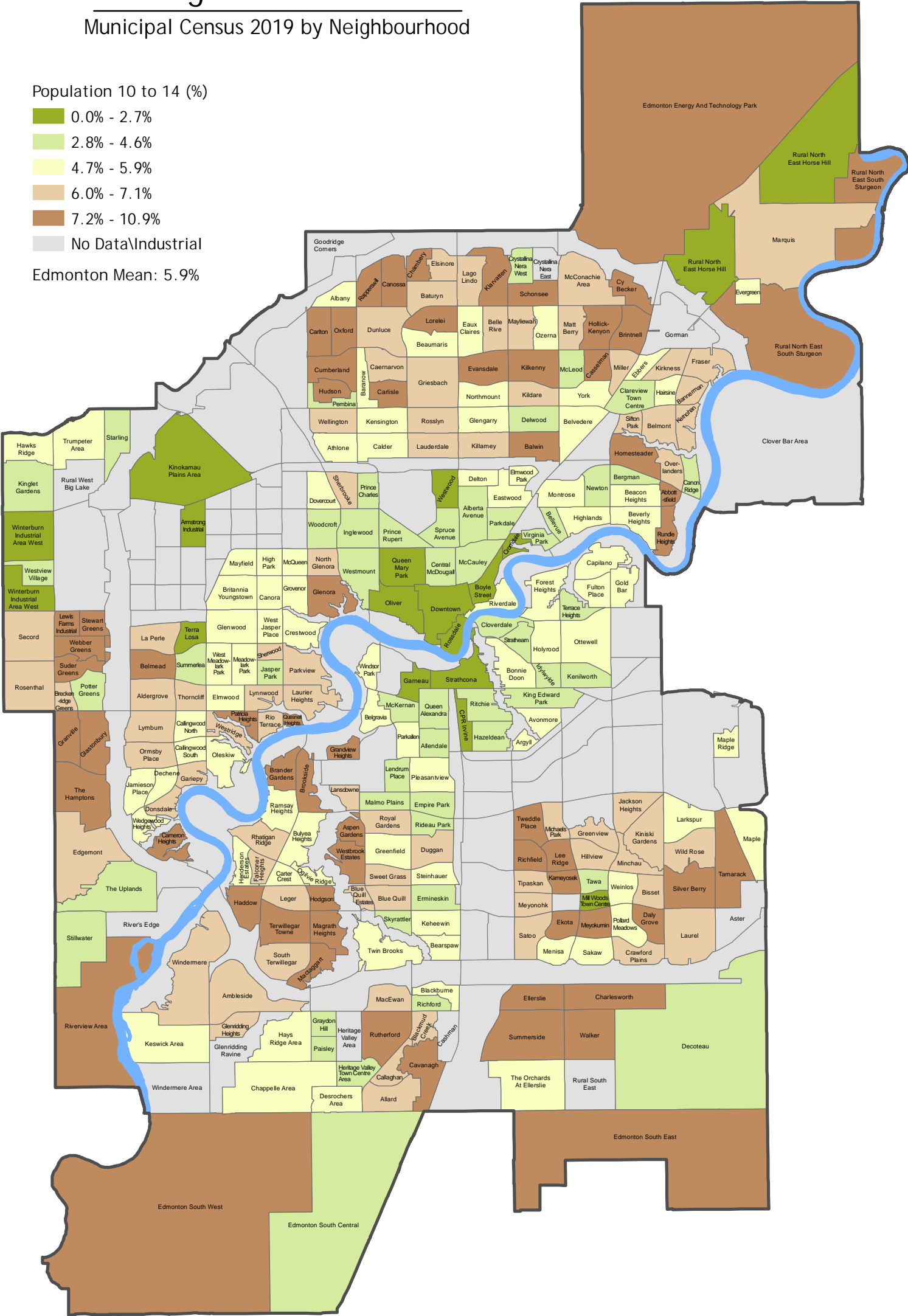
# Percent of Population Ages 10 to 14

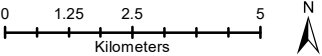


# Population Ages 25 to 29

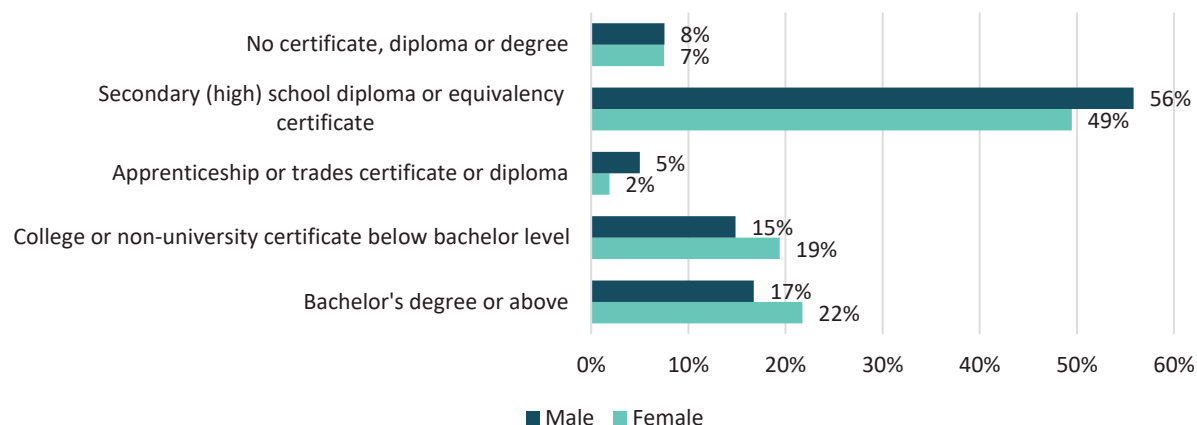


## Educational Attainment

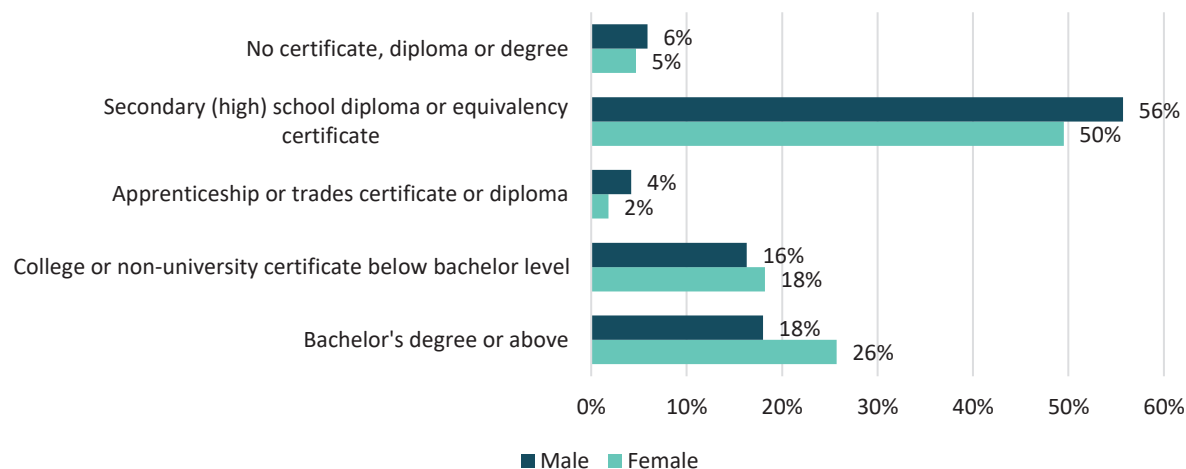
The highest level of education attained provides a snapshot of completed progress as of 2016. With the exception of trade qualifications, females had attained higher levels of education than their male counterparts in both the general population as well as in the three minority groups. It is expected that a large proportion of youth aged 15-19 were still in the process of gaining education, therefore only ages 20-24 years are presented in the highest level of education data table.



### Immigrant youth aged 20-24: Highest level of education: Edmonton CMA, 2016

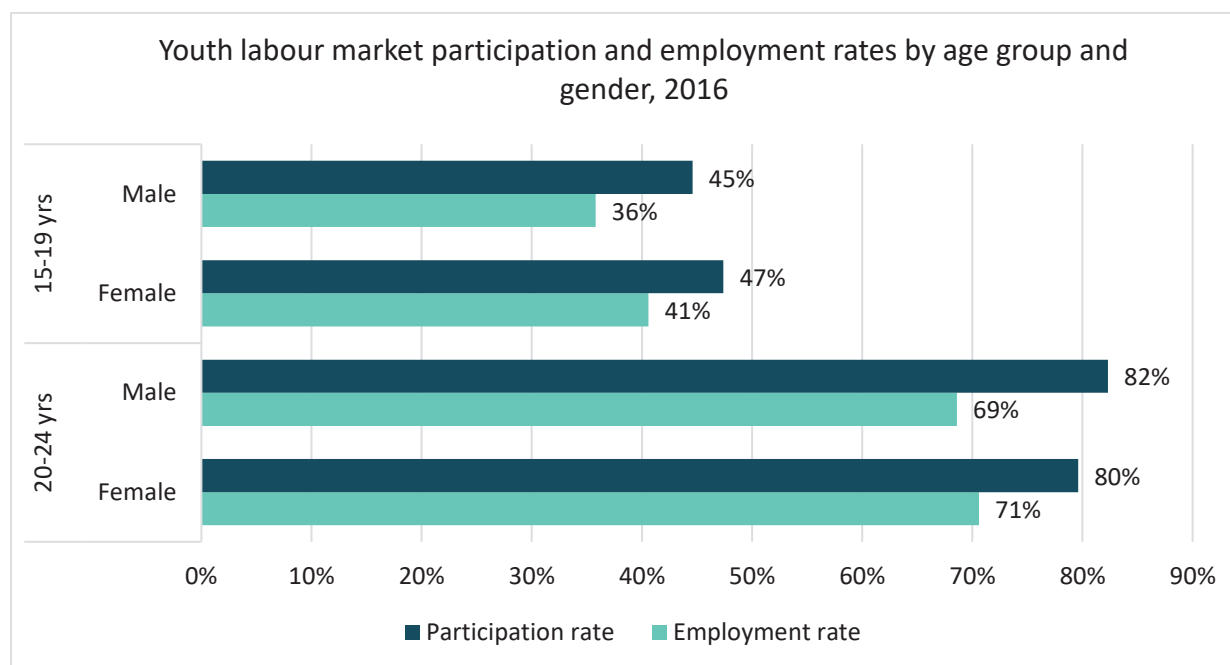


### Visible minority youth aged 20-24: Highest level of education by gender, 2016

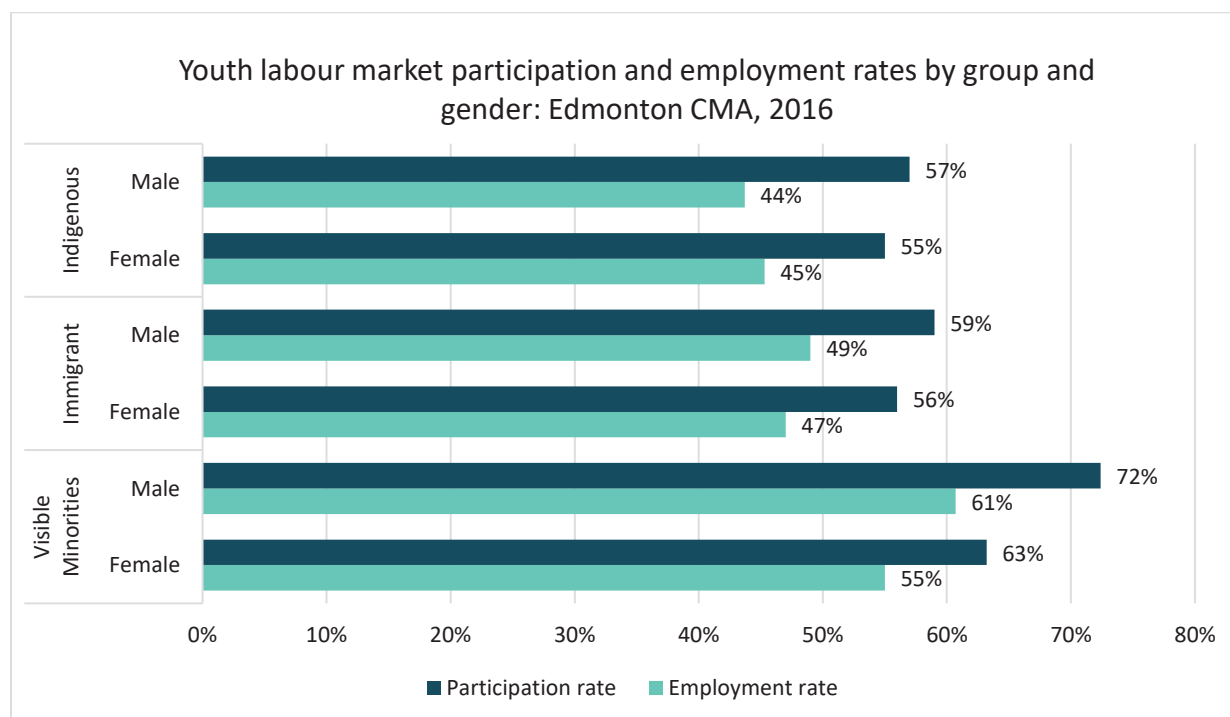


## Economy and Workforce

One is considered to be participating in the labour force if they are employed or seeking employment. Employment includes both part-time and full-time work.



Labour market participation and employment rates by group show that, regardless of gender, visible minority youth are more likely to be participating in the labour market and are also more likely to be employed.

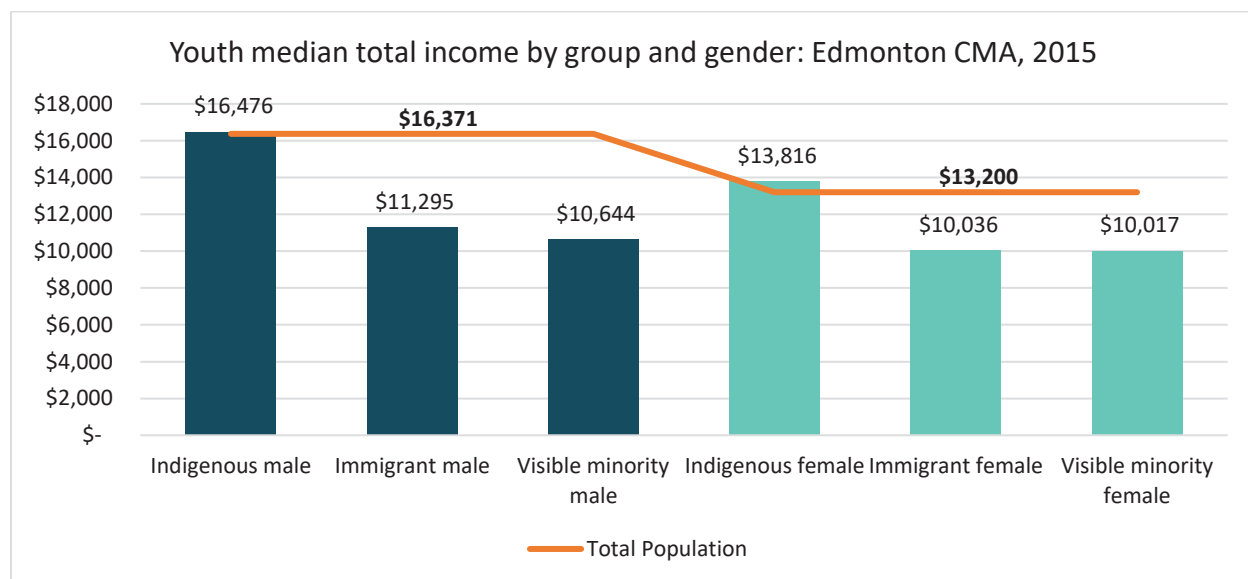


## Income

Income data included in the 2016 Census of Canada is based on earnings from 2015. Income data is available for both the 15 to 19 and 20 to 24 year age groups for the entire youth population. Minority group data, however, is only available for the 15 to 24 age group. It is important to note that the incomes presented do not differentiate between those working part-time or full-time. It is expected that youth who are attending school may not be working full-time, a factor that serves to lower total income levels.

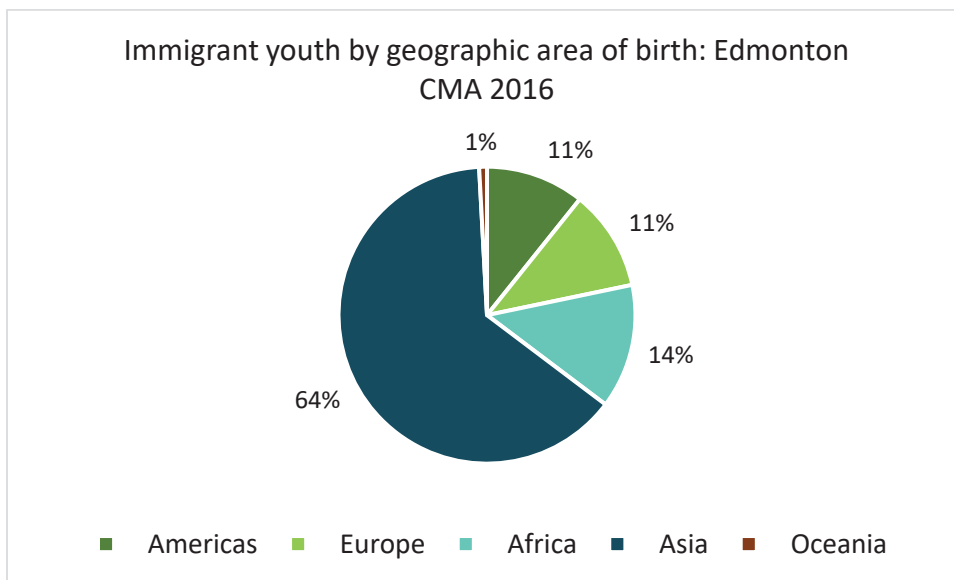
Median total income data is presented for three groups: Indigenous; immigrant; and visible minority. While 4 in 5 of the total youth population report income, that proportion falls to 1 in 4 for minority groups. These proportions do not differ by gender. Females consistently have lower total incomes than their male counterparts. The orange line across the table indicates the median total incomes by gender for the total population of youth.

Approximately 3 in 4 youth were employed in 2015. While there are no gender differences in the proportion of those employed females earn significantly less (\$13,200) than their male counterparts (\$16,371), regardless of the group. A calculation of female earnings on the male dollar shows that female youth earn 81 cents for every dollar male youth earn. This gender inequity increases with age into adulthood.

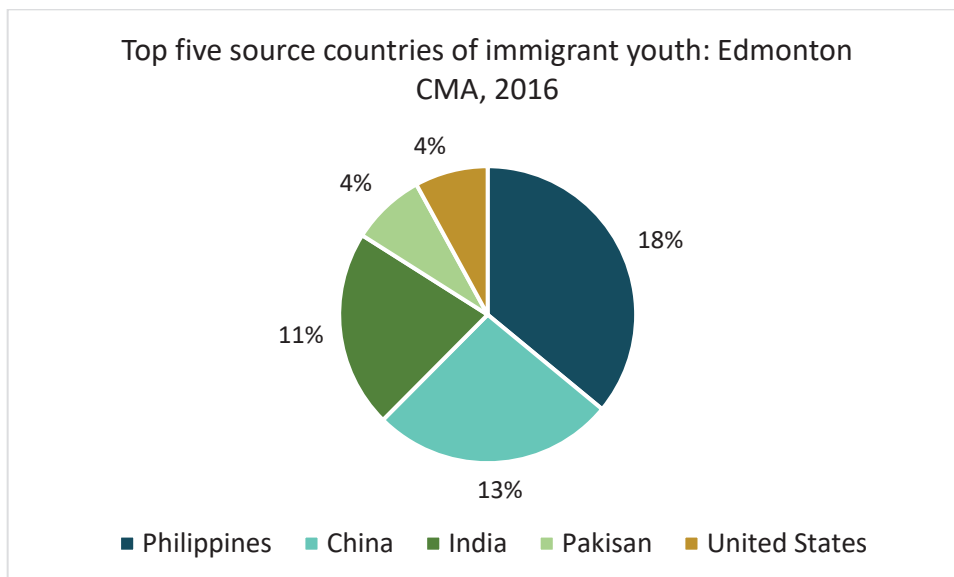


## Immigrant

One in four youth were born outside of Canada. This proportion does not change by age group or gender. The following table shows the geographic area of birth for immigrant youth.

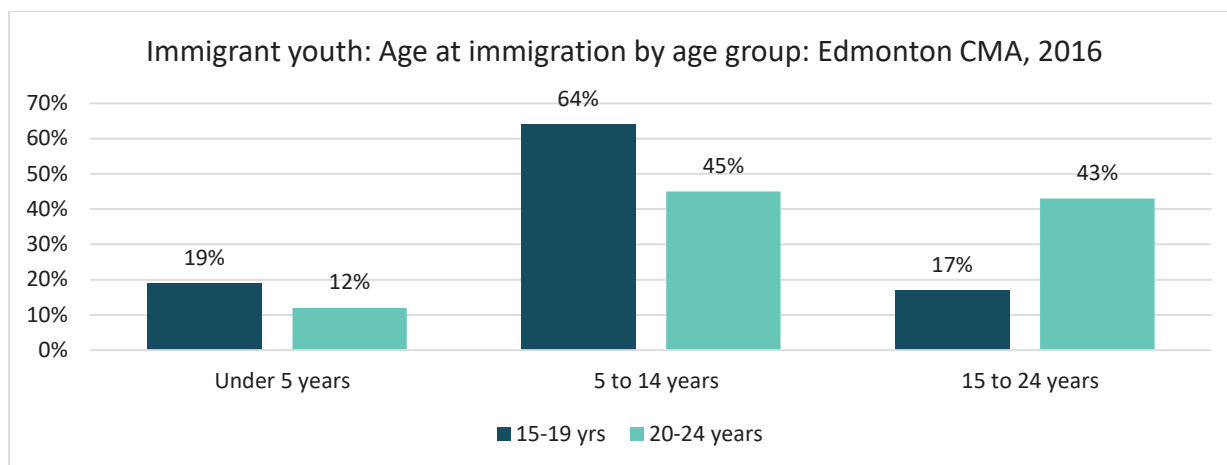


Immigrant youth come from 147 countries of birth. The top five countries of birth account for half of immigrant youth. There are no gender differences in country of birth.

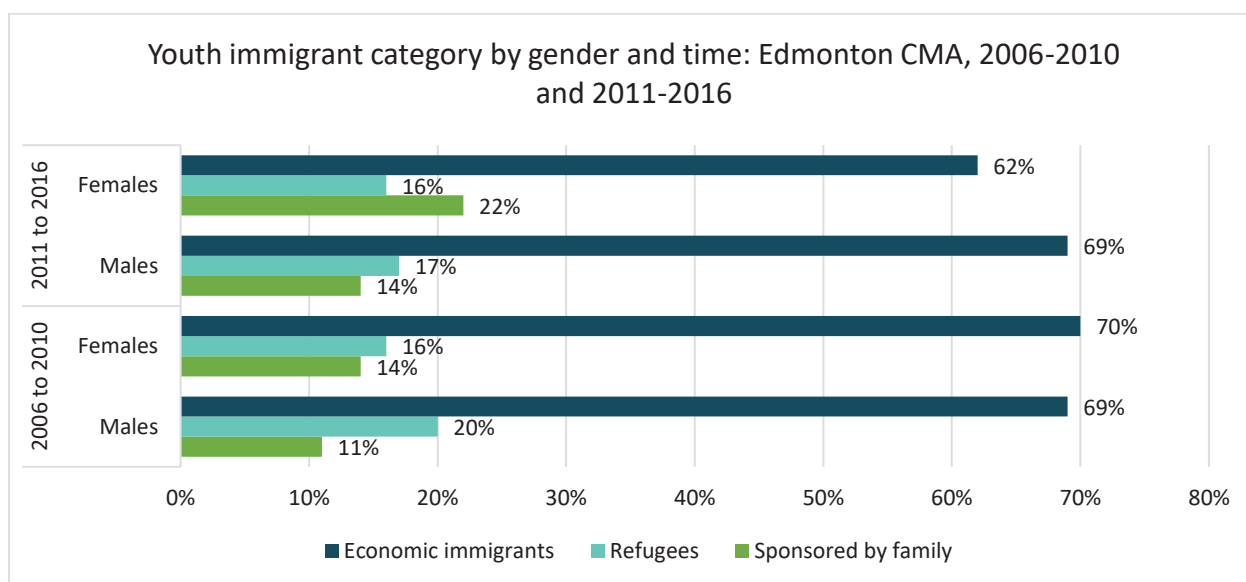


The majority of immigrant youth arrived in Canada between the ages of 5 and 14. There are no significant gender differences in age at arrival in Canada.



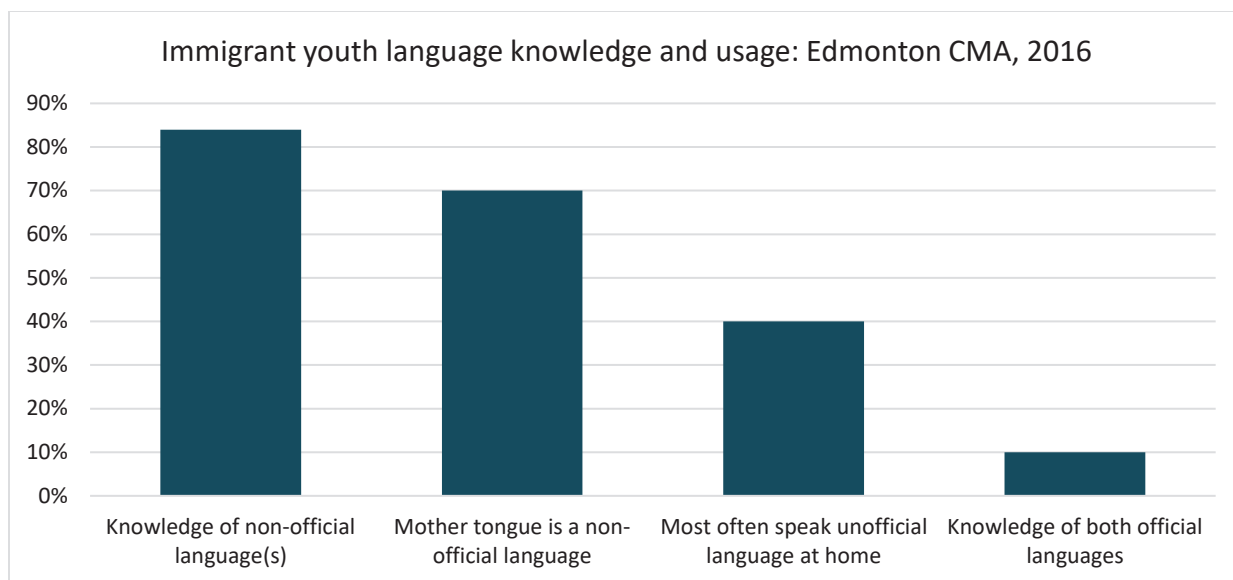


Immigrants arrive in Canada utilizing a number of immigration programs. Immigrant youth may be included in the categories if they came with a parent or parents who qualified, or if they came alone under this qualification. The categories include economic class<sup>1</sup>, refugees and family sponsorship. Between 2011 and 2016 the largest gender difference in immigration category is a 7% lower proportion of female economic immigrants than their male counterparts.



Overall, regardless of age, 99% of immigrant youth speak at least one official language. The following table shows immigrant youth language knowledge and usage. There are no significant age group or gender differences, thus the data is presented in grouped format.

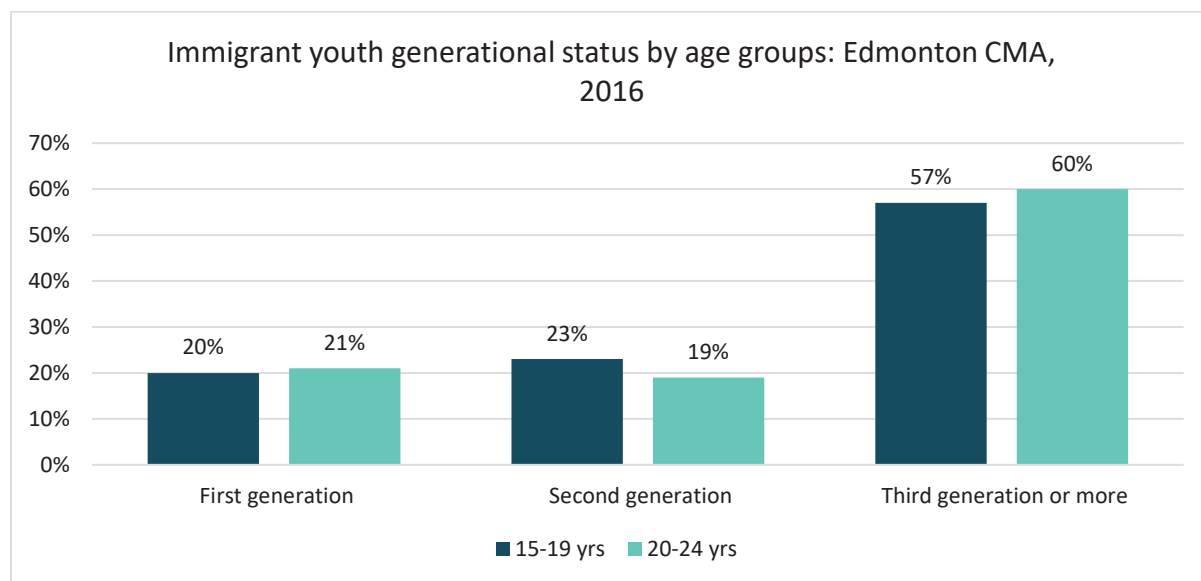

## Generation History

Canada is a nation largely settled by immigrants. The following table shows generational data from 2017 tax filer information. To look at the history of immigration, three measures are used. They are defined by Statistics Canada as follows:

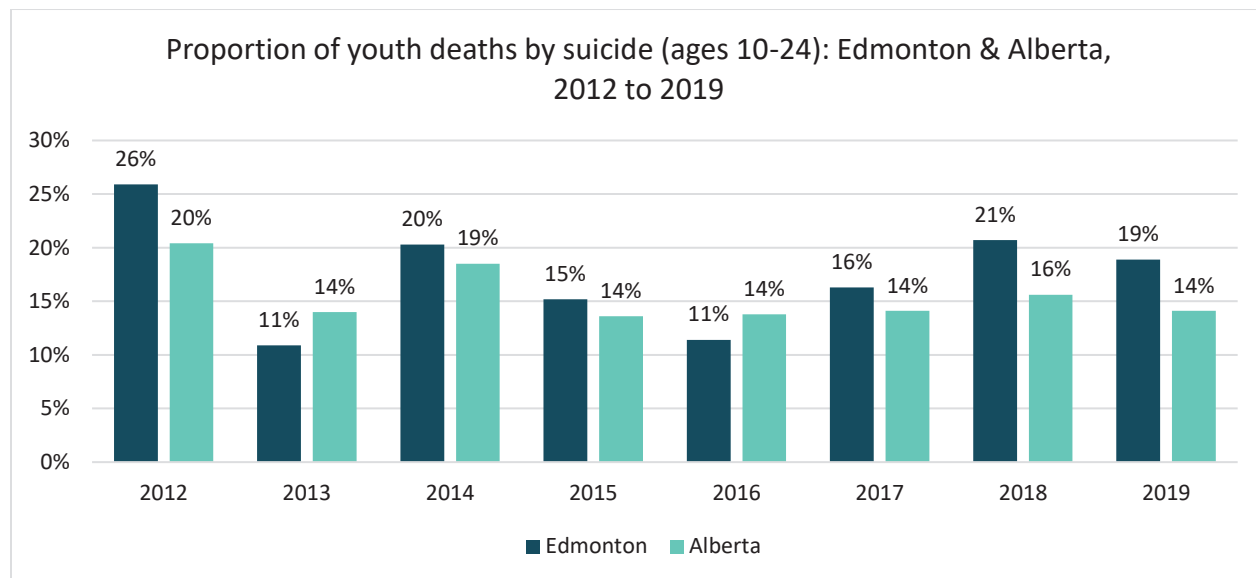
- First generation includes persons who were born outside Canada.
- Second generation includes persons who were born in Canada and had at least one parent born outside Canada. For the most part, these are the children of immigrants.
- Third generation or more includes persons who were born in Canada with both parents born in Canada



## Health

### Suicide

An examination of youth suicide data from 2012 to 2019 shows death by suicide as a proportion of all deaths for ages 10 to 24 years (Alberta Justice and Solicitor General, 2020). Note that data for 2018 and 2019 are preliminary and may change as the numbers are finalized.

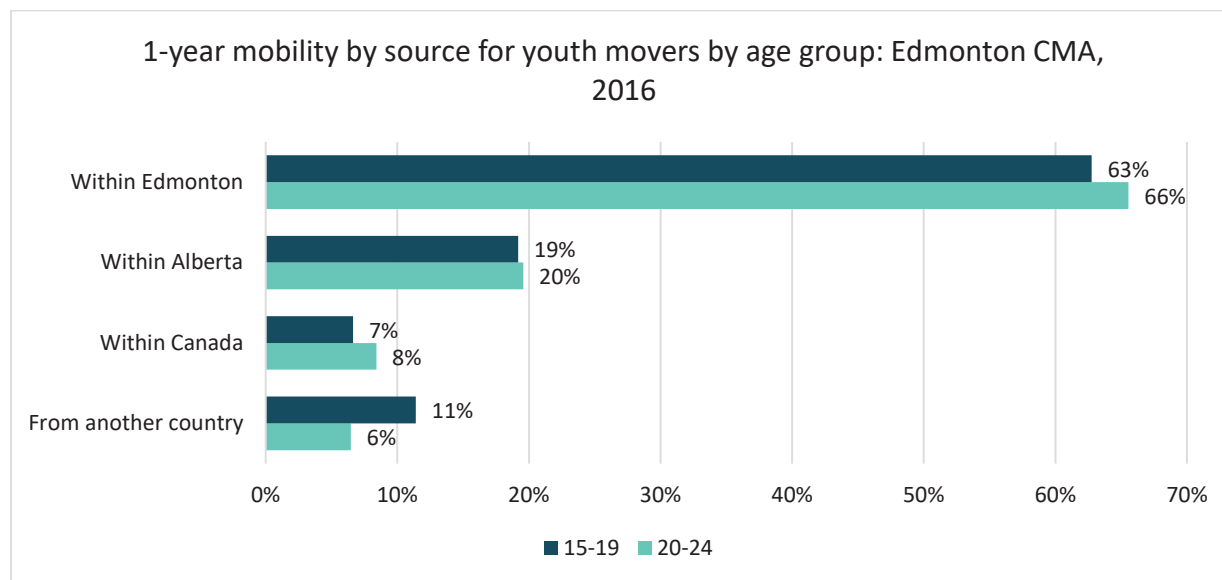


## Housing

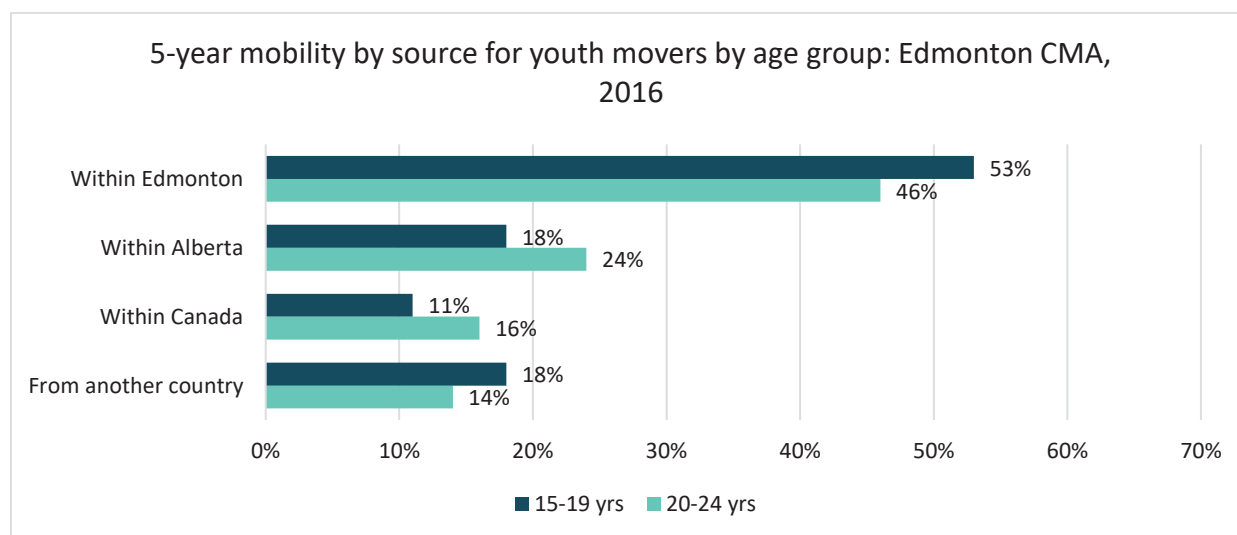
In 2016, 2% of 15-19 year olds were the primary maintainers of households. Of this small proportion, 1 in 10 owned their home while the remainder rented. For youth aged 20-24 years, 20% were the primary maintainers of their household. Within that proportion of primary maintainers, 2 in 10 were renters.

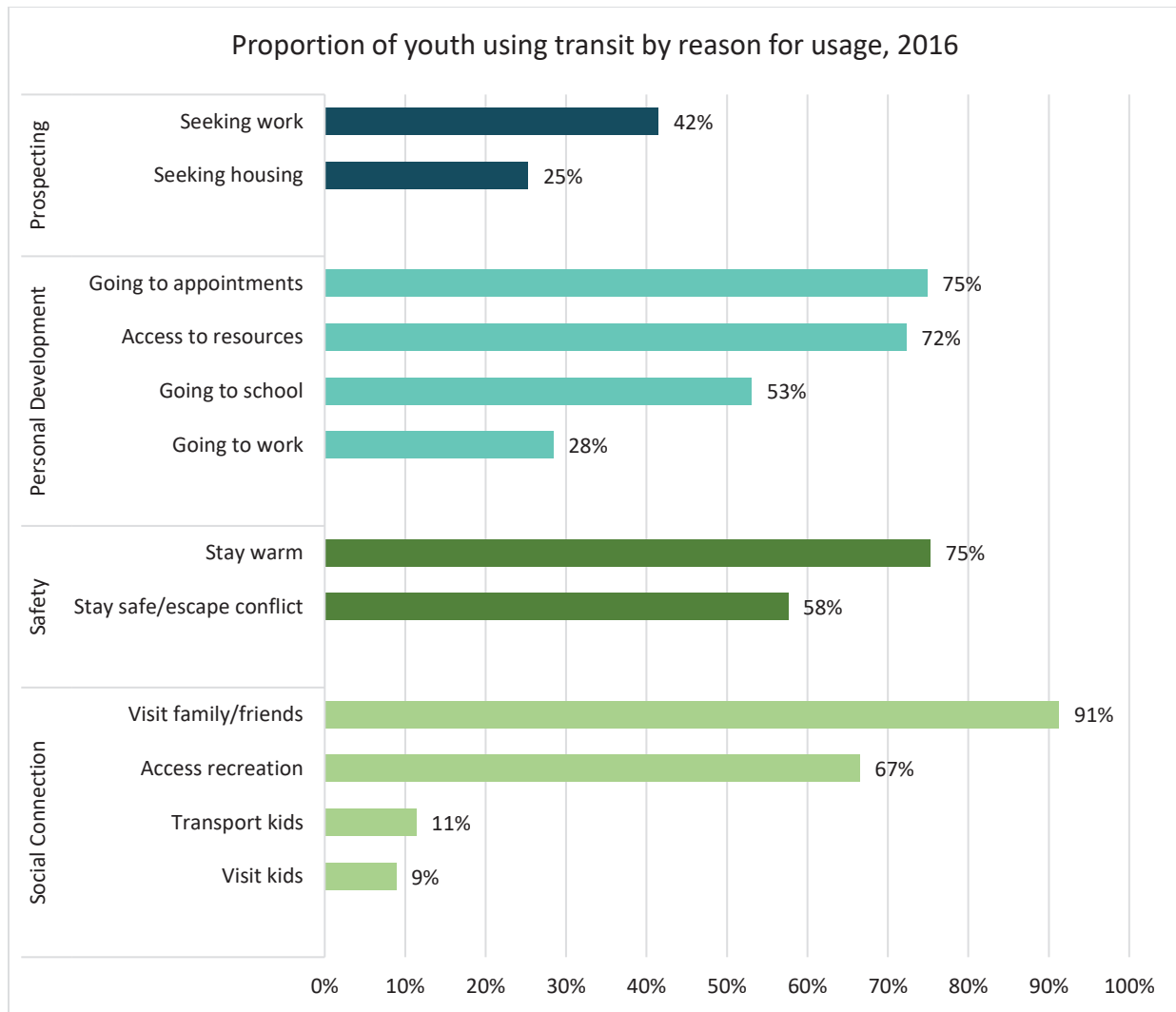
## Mobility

Within the year prior to the 2016 census, 16% of those aged 15 to 19 years, and 31% of those 20 to 24 years moved residence at least one time. There are no gender differences with regard to moving. The following table shows proportions of movers by where they moved from.



Within the five years prior to the 2016 census, 42% of those aged 15 to 19 years, and 59% of those 20 to 24 years, moved residence at least one time. There were no gender differences with regard to moving. The following table shows proportions of movers by where they moved from.



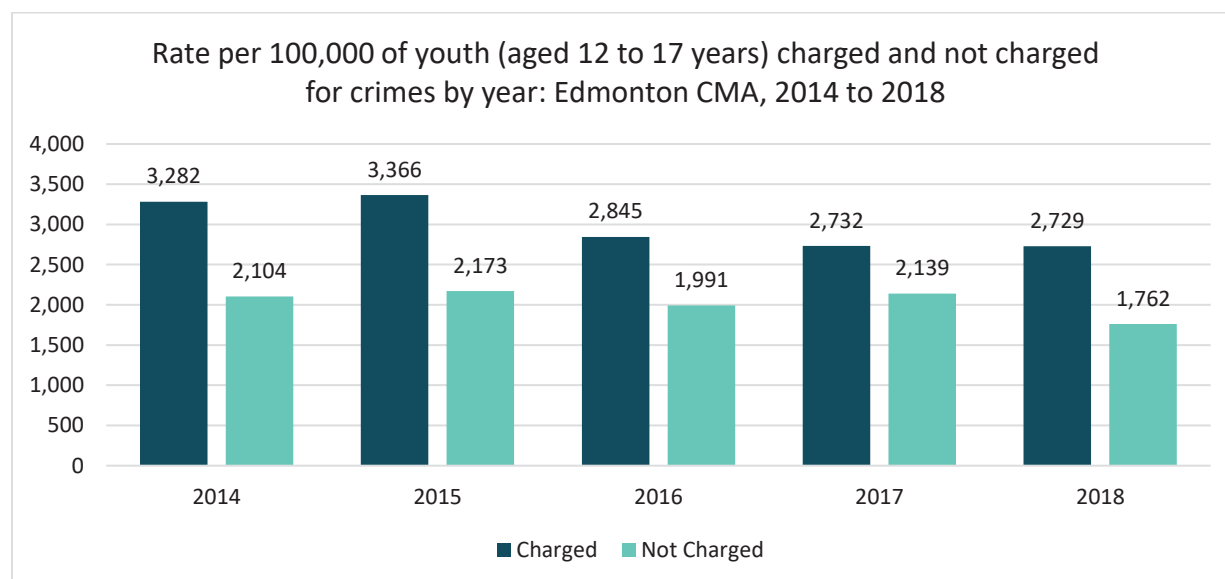
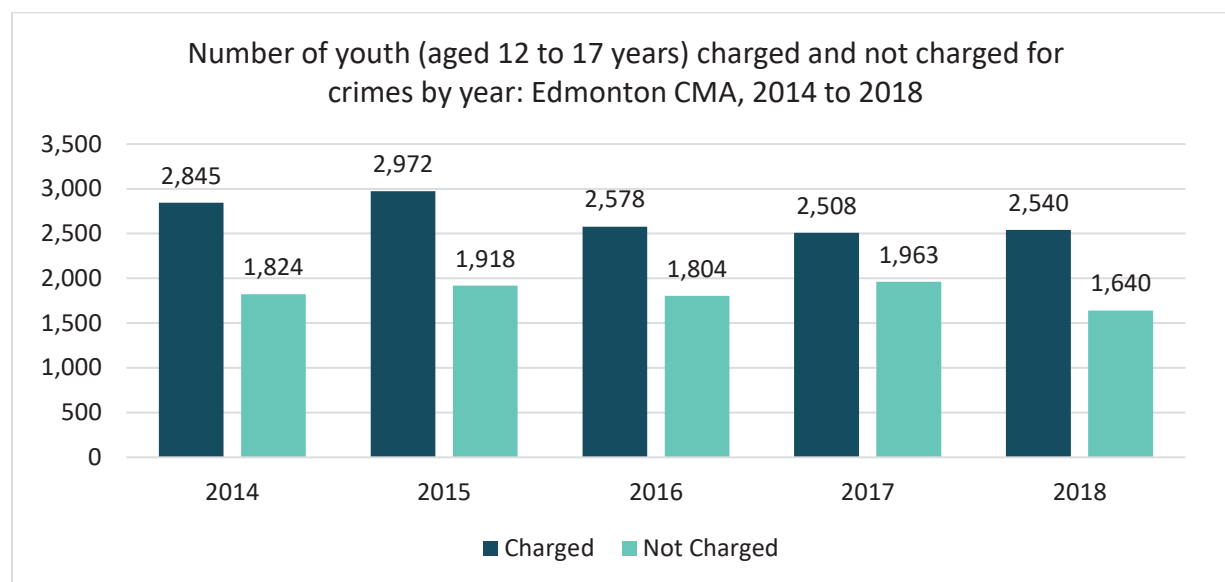

The following StatsCan data includes only youth ages 12 to 17. All statistics for those ages 18-24 are included with data for all adults and cannot be parsed out.

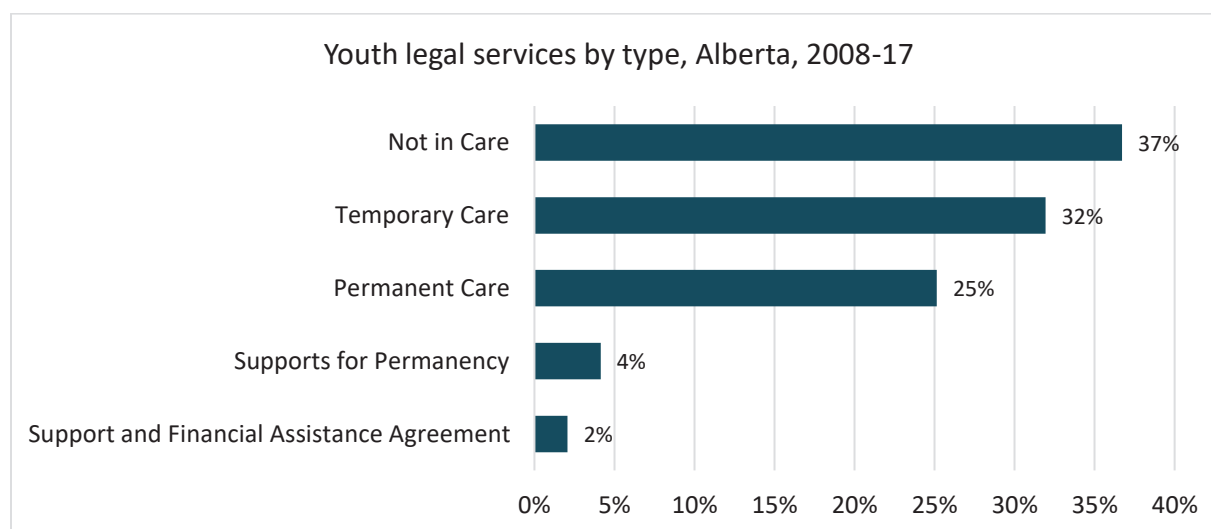


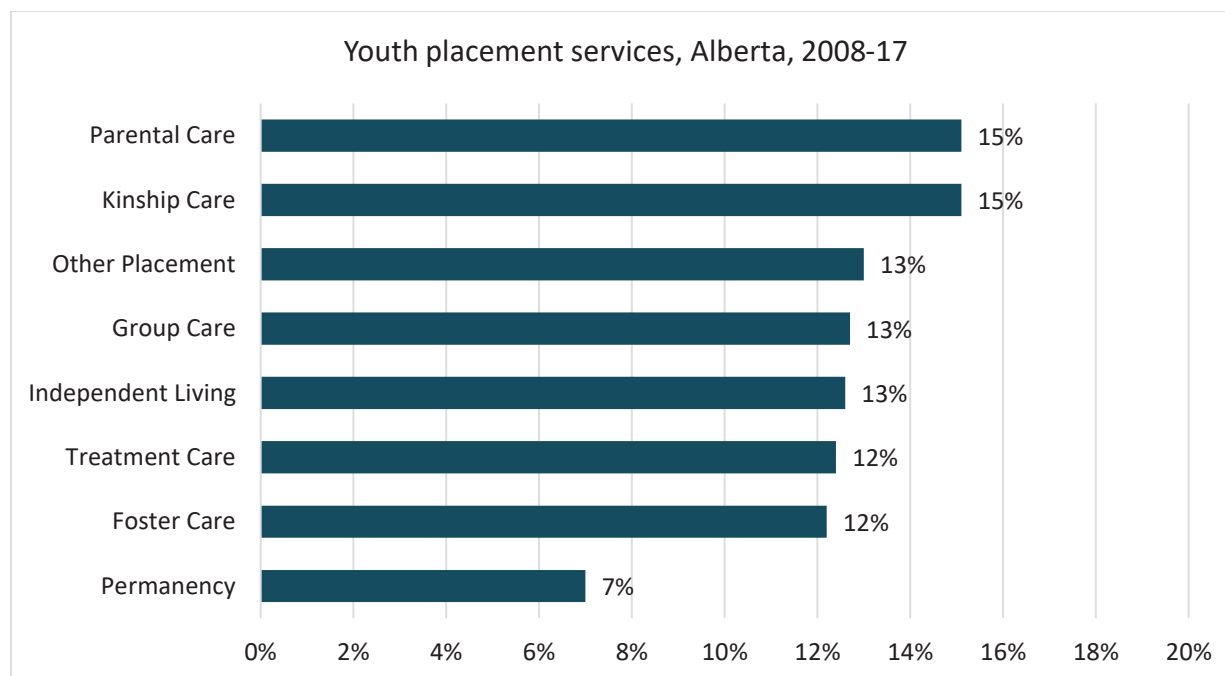
## Intervention Supports – EXAMPLE ONLY USING ALBERTA DATASET

While the following discussion and tables show Alberta data, this section shows what is possible if we were able to access this data for Edmonton. Data on child intervention is taken from the Alberta Human Services open data website and covers services from 2008-2017. Because the data is presented in a dataset rather than a table, it is possible to check for statistical significance and have a greater range of analysis opportunities.

Youth comprise 47% of all clients and an average of 205 cases per year. Indigenous youth are vastly over-represented as they form only 9% of the Alberta youth population yet comprise 50% of the clients in child interventions.. There are no significant differences by gender or Indigenous/non-Indigenous with regard to the type of service received.
